

ETHIOPIA: LAND OF ANCIENT KUSH

June 24: WASHINGTON / ADDIS ABABA Depart Washington International Airport via Ethiopian Airlines to Addis Ababa. Meals will be served on board.

June 25: ADDIS ABABA Upon your arrival at Bole International Airport in Addis Ababa, you will be met and transferred to your hotel. In the afternoon, you will be taken for sightseeing around Addis Ababa and visit Trinity Cathedral, the Ethnological Museum, and Mt. Entoto with its panoramic view. In the evening, enjoy a welcoming dinner at a traditional Ethiopian restaurant, featuring dancers and musicians representing some of the country's many ethnic groups.

June 26: ADDIS ABABA / AXUM Late morning transfer to the airport for your flight to Axum. Axum was the capital of a major kingdom, and one of the oldest African empires which represented a crucial trading point between Africa and Asia for almost a thousand years. Legends narrate in the Kebre Negast (Book of Kings) how Axum as early as the 10th century BCE was already the region where the Queen of Sheba resided. Among the notable sights are the astounding array of towering granite obelisks or stelae, the Ezana's stone inscriptions, the stone Throne of the Judges, tombs of the kings, and the Church of St. Mary of Zion, containing crowns of past emperors of Ethiopia. It is in Axum that the Ark of the Covenant is allegedly kept. The well-guarded sanctuary chapel of the Ark of the Covenant is believed to be located there, and the visitor may approach, but never hope to enter. Return to your hotel for dinner and overnight. *Evening lecture*.

July 27: AXUM Drive to the Adwa Hills to visit the site where the Ethiopian army defeated the Italians in the historic Battle of Adwa in March 1896. Continue our drive to the Temple of Yeha (8th century BCE), which is the oldest standing structure in Ethiopia. Return to Axum, balance of the afternoon to explore Axum on your own. Dinner and overnight at your hotel. *Evening lecture*.

June 28: AXUM / ADDIS ABABA Complete your exploration of the historic region of Axum and visit the granite rock quarries. Afternoon flight to Addis Ababa. Dinner and overnight at your hotel.. *Evening lecture*.

June 29: ADDIS ABABA / BAHIR DAR Early morning flight to Bahir Dar for *a day trip*. Bahir Dar is on the southern shore of Lake Tana. The Blue Nile originates in Lake Tana, just as the White Nile originates in Lake Nyanza ("Lake Victoria") in Tanzania, Uganda, and Kenya. The two rivers merge together to form the Nile River in Khartoum, Sudan. Enjoy the scenery of the beautiful Lake Tana. Visit the majestic Tis Isat Falls (Smoke of Fire) where the waters of the Blue Nile thunder some 200 feet into a chasm. At Tis Isat Falls climb down to the base of falls for an up-close look and climb back up from the other side. Boat over to the origins of the Blue Nile, and then drive to the Woyito Village to see the production of papyrus boats (tankwas). Afterwards, visit the local market, and if time permits visit the Bezawit Palace (former Palace of Haile Selassie). Early evening return flight to Addis Ababa. Dinner and overnight at your hotel.

June 30: LALIBELA Early morning flight to Lalibela. This location is named after the king who in the 12th century initiated construction of the eleven rock hewn churches, which have been hailed a wonder of the world. Visit 6 of the monolithic underground churches at Lalibela. Dinner and overnight at your hotel. *Evening lecture*.

July 1: LALIBELA / **ADDIS ABABA** Visit the remaining 5 churches, all of which date back to the 12th-13th century C.E. UNESCO declared these incredible churches as World Heritage Sites in 1978. Afternoon flight to Addis Ababa, and visit the John C. Robinson grave in Gulele Cemetery, and then the Adwa Victory Memorial Museum. Dinner and overnight at your hotel. *Evening lecture*.

NOTE: Omo Valley The dozens of indigenous groups in the vast South Ethiopia Regional State are unique and still maintain their traditional culture and beliefs. The Omo Valley itinerary (July 3-7) is flexible which means that if we learn of, for example, a "Bull-Jumping" rite of passage for men coming of age and must be performed before he is permitted to marry, then we will alter our schedule to witness this ceremony. However, we will change only the visitation dates, but keep all the main places of interest.

July 2: ADDIS ABABA / OMO VALLEY Early flight to Arba Minch in the south. Drive to the Dorze village and learn about their cultural traditions and economic production from the *enset* plant. The Dorze people are renown for their exceptional weaving skills and their unique huts, which are shaped like elephants and constructed using bamboo. Afterwards, drive to the Konso village and learn about their renown stone terrace walls and 18-year age-grade system of governance. Dinner and overnight at your lodge. *Evening lecture.*

July 3: OMO VALLEY Drive from Konso to Turmi and visit a Hamer village. Dinner and overnight at your hotel.

July 4: OMO VALLEY Drive from Turmi to visit the Kara and Nyangatom villages and meet with a chief and elders, and return to Turmi. *Evening lecture*.

July 5: OMO VALLEY Drive to meet the Dasenech children and village. Continue drive to Jinka City. Visit Jinka University and the Wonta Lodge project. Dinner and overnight at your hotel.

July 6: OMO VALLEY Drive through Mago National Park to visit a Mursi village. Return to Jinka and visit the South Omo Research Center (SORC). Dinner and overnight at your hotel. *Evening lecture*.

July 7: OMO VALLEY / ADDIS ABABA Morning flight to Addis Ababa and visit the huge Mercato Market, then on to the National Museum (where the remains of Lucy and Selam are located). In the afternoon, continue tour of historic Addis Ababa and visit the Shiromeda market. Dinner and *Final evening lecture*.

July 8: ADDIS ABABA / WASHINGTON, DC Most of the day at leisure. Evening departure from Addis Ababa on your return flight home. Arrival in Washington, DC the next morning.

July 9: WASHINGTON, DC Arrival in Washington, DC early morning local time.

This unique historical and cultural tour of Ethiopia blends the historical sites in the north with a survey of southern indigenous groups in the Omo Valley in the south. The tour is extended to 16 days to maximize the *cultural exchange* with these southern groups.
